Program Year 2 CAPER Executive Summary response:

This is the second year the City of Venice was an entitlement community for Community Development Block Grants (CDBG). The Venice Housing Authority began infrastructure and construction design of the new development. The city executed an agreement with Sarasota County to join the Urban County entitlement starting in Fiscal Year 2011.

Accomplishment in Year One	The city set aside \$5,000 for All Faith’s Food bank. A two year contract was executed, but All Faith’s Food Bank contacted the city stating that they will not need the funds. A substantial amendment was done to move funds over to the Venice Housing Authority.

Need	1
Priority	1: Affordable housing was ranked the highest priority by service providers and city council to address the troubled Venice Housing Authority.

Strategy	The Venice Housing Authority is working to create a master plan for a new housing authority. The city will set aside funds from CDBG to help with infrastructure.
Obstacles	Limited amounts of funding, "not in my backyard" views, may be limits on how the property can be developed.
Resources	Venice Housing Authority, various non-profit organizations. The city will provide CDBG funds to assist with stormwater, infrastructure, lighting and/or sidewalks.
Funding	CDBG \$135,010 over a two year period.
Time Period	2 years – 50 low income/minority households to benefit.
Accomplishment in Year One	The city set aside \$67,180.80 for year one and \$67,829.60 for year two to the Venice Housing Authority. A two year contract was executed. \$10,000 allocated to All Faith's Food Bank has been reallocated to the housing authority project.

In the five year Consolidated Plan, the first two years of funding was to go toward stormwater improvements at the Venice Municipal Mobile Home Park (low income census tract), while the last three years of funding was to go toward the troubled Venice Housing Authority. \$5,000 a year over two years was set aside for local food banks. During the first program year, the City was pleased to be informed that the Venice Housing Authority is moving forward with their reconstruction project sooner than projected. The city adjusted the Year One Action Plan to move the housing authority's funding allocation to this fiscal year. A contract between the City of Venice and Venice Housing Authority was executed.

The stormwater infrastructure project at the low/moderate income mobile home park is now being funded by State of Florida Disaster Grant funding. The project is currently in design phase. All Faith's Food Bank, who was to receive \$5,000 a year, informed the city that they would not use their funds due to ample other sources. A substantial amendment is being completed in conjunction with this report.

During the course of the year, \$24,506, the entire amount of CDBG-R allocated funds, were spent. Also, the city spent \$108,018.22 of entitlement CDBG funds with all funding going to the housing authority.

It is hard to evaluate how the process could be changed since it was the city's second year of being an entitlement community. After a program audit performed in April 2009, the city took steps to keep better records, spend funds, and obtain access to the IDIS system. If the city continued to receive future CDBG funding, additional staff would be needed to follow the program full time. Currently, city and Sarasota County staffs share monitoring and administration duties for the program.

According to the 2000 Census, the total population of Venice was 17,764. Out of the 17,764 total, there is a very small minority population of 241. In the census tract where the housing authority project is located, the 2000 Census shows that there are 53 minorities out of a total of 1,628 residents.

Under the Sarasota Consortium, the City of Sarasota monitors and coordinates fair housing activities for the City of Venice. Sarasota County will prepare a new Impediments to Fair Housing Analysis in conjuncture with the 2011-2016 consolidated planning process which will include the City of Venice. Sarasota uses CDBG funds dedicated to fair housing to educate the community on fair housing laws. Community education has included landlord training seminars and distribution

of fair housing material. Impediments include high housing costs (lack of affordable housing) although the situation is improving due to the recession. Programs such as the Homelessness Prevention and Rapid Rehousing Program are being implemented to help the situation.

The City of Venice continued to work with the Sarasota Consortium and provide the Suncoast Partnership to End Homelessness with information and technical assistance where needed.

The city does not qualify for HOME funds and the Sarasota Consortium did not provide HOME funds to Venice residents during fiscal year 2008/2009 due to our entitlement status. The City of Sarasota is the recipient of HOPWA and SHIP funds and the City of Venice participates in an interlocal agreement with the City of Sarasota/Sarasota Consortium for them to oversee and administer those programs on behalf of the city and the rest of Sarasota County. The City of Sarasota has also dedicated funds towards the Venice Housing Authority to assist the redevelopment.

The Gulf Coast Community Foundation of Venice is still working to complete the Bridges project which is a mixed income development in the eastern section of the city. The foundation is currently working on land zoning changes. The Venice Housing Authority, which is using CDBG funds from Sarasota County and Venice, expects to match the CDBG funds with Section 202 grants, non-profit grants and/or bonds.

Managing the Process

Program Year 2 CAPER Managing the Process response:

The city reviewed invoice submittals from the Venice Housing Authority to ensure compliance and any questions were directed to Sarasota County for expert assistance. The city met with the housing authority on several occasions to coordinate water line, sidewalk, zoning, planning and other construction requirements.

The city coordinated with All Faith's Food Bank and it was determined that the funds should be reallocated to the housing authority. All Faith's Food Bank told staff that it has substantial supplies from other sources. A substantial amendment was required since, per our Citizen Participation Plan, 50% or more of the intended beneficiaries are affected. The substantial amendment is being advertised along with this document.

Program Year 2 CAPER Citizen Participation response:

The City of Venice adopted a Citizen Participation Plan on April 22, 2008. This plan outlines the steps to obtain public comment on the Consolidated Plan, Action Plans and Performance Reports.

In Year Two, the city received \$91,031. \$67,824.80 was set aside for infrastructure at the Venice Housing Authority (low/moderate income elderly housing at 201 Grove Street), \$5,000 for All Faith's Food Bank (elderly and homeless needs), and \$18,206.20 (20%) for program administration. Contracts were executed between the Venice Housing Authority and All Faith's Food Bank for CDBG funding.

During the course of the year, \$24,506, the entire amount of CDBG-R allocated funds, were spent. Also, the city spent \$108,018.22 of entitlement CDBG funds with all funding going to the housing authority. In the census tract where the housing authority project is located, the 2000 Census shows that there are 53 minorities out of a total of 1,628 residents.

Institutional Structure

1. Describe actions taken during the last year to overcome gaps in institutional structures and enhance coordination.

Program Year 2 CAPER Institutional Structure response:

HUD came to the city on April 27 and 28, 2009 for a first year monitoring visit. Funds were drawn for the Venice Housing Authority in 2010. The city worked closely with Sarasota County for reporting and compliance issues.

The Sarasota Consortium, the Suncoast Partnership to End Homelessness, and numerous non-profit organizations that deliver public services provide an invaluable service to improving the lives of the citizens of Venice. The city continued working with Sarasota Consortium and its partners while strengthening these relationships. Any gaps that arise in program delivery may be overcome by the variety of available partners.

Also, the city worked very closely with the troubled Venice Housing Authority to assist redevelopment. Funding was moved up from Year Three to Year One of the Consolidated Plan because the authority was ready to begin their project sooner than expected. The city met with the housing authority on several occasions to coordinate plans and help facilitate reconstruction of the buildings.

Program Year 2 CAPER Monitoring response:

The program is effective in restoring low income housing in city limits. Support to the housing authority was provided throughout the year. The city spent the second program year meeting with the Venice Housing Authority to coordinate reconstruction of the building. The housing authority spent CDBG funds on infrastructure design and permitting for the new buildings. There were no construction activities to monitor during the second program year.

The city was contacted by All Faith's Food Bank and they stated that they would not be able to spend the \$10,000 allocated to them because they had sufficient supplies. The funding will be relocated to the Venice Housing Authority since they are a high priority project and have the most need.

The housing authority will be providing 50 units of low/moderate housing elderly within the next three years. The project was delayed by one year due to not being selected last year for state funding. The housing authority is applying for grants, bonds, and state funding again this year.

Indicators that would best describe the results would be the production of draft redevelopment plans and permit processing that has taken place to date.

Lead-based Paint

1. Describe actions taken during the last year to evaluate and reduce lead-based paint hazards.

Program Year 2 CAPER Lead-based Paint response:

Based on information from the Sarasota Consortium and the Sarasota County Health Department, there is not a recent history of lead-based paint hazards and there has not been a widespread problem.

The city continued to cooperate with the Sarasota Consortium which takes the following measures to evaluate and reduce lead based paint hazards:

- Low income homeowners who discover lead based paint in their homes will qualify for a grant to remedy the risks posed by the lead.
- Individuals qualifying for rental assistance through the Section 8 program will receive a HUD pamphlet titled "Protect Your Family from Lead in Your Home"
- Owners of Section 8 rental properties constructed prior to 1979 that receive Federal assistance through the Sarasota Office of Housing and Community development are required to send new tenants the applicable lead-based paint notices
- Section 8 units and sites must be in compliance with the new HUD lead based paint regulations
- Individuals taking part in a Down Payment Assistance Program receive a copy of "Protect Your Family from Lead in Your Home"
- Units rehabilitated using federal funds will be required to abide by new HUD lead based paint regulations.

HOUSING

Housing Needs

1. Describe Actions taken during the last year to foster and maintain affordable housing.

Program Year 2 CAPER Housing Needs response:

The non-profit sector has been working on affordable housing. The Gulf Coast Community Foundation of Venice continues to work toward creating an affordable housing development within Venice city limits. Habitat for Humanity provided homes for 5 homeless families this year using Sarasota County Neighborhood Stabilization funds.

The Venice Housing Authority is finalizing plans, applying for permits and preparing utilities for construction of the new housing authority building. The building will include senior and mixed income housing. The city met with the housing authority on several occasions

The city is reviewing permitting and development fees to make affordable housing easier for development.

Specific Housing Objectives

Program Year 2 CAPER Specific Housing Objectives response:

One objective was stated in the Year Two Action plan under Specific Housing Objectives. The objective was for the city to work with the Gulf Coast Community Foundation of Venice to assist with the development of the Bridges project and assist Habitat for Humanity. The Bridges project is currently going through the rezoning process. Between October 1, 2008 and September 30, 2009, Habitat for Humanity was able to house 5 new families through the Neighborhood Stabilization Program. Habitat for Humanity also has been hit hard during the recession, losing about half of their donations.

The Sarasota Consortium continued to assist residents within city limits in finding affordable housing.

Public Housing Strategy

1. Describe actions taken during the last year to improve public housing and resident initiatives.

Program Year 2 CAPER Public Housing Strategy response:

All of the city’s CDBG funds are being allocated to the public housing authority. The Venice Housing Authority has been labeled by HUD as troubled. All residents at the housing authority have been relocated and current buildings demolished. The \$10,000 set aside for food banks is being allocated to the housing authority to assist in redevelopment.

Norstar/Primerica Multi-Family Development Group is overseeing project development. All buildings were demolished and redevelopment will be split into two phases. Phase 1 will be low/moderate income senior housing; Phase 2 will be multi-family low/moderate income units. The developer is sought Florida tax credits for the first phase and was not chosen. Another application was submitted this year. City council voted to allocate Year 1 and Year 2 CDBG funds towards infrastructure design in phase 1. The City of Sarasota has also committed funds to the Venice Housing Authority.

Barriers to Affordable Housing

1. Describe actions taken during the last year to eliminate barriers to affordable housing.

Program Year 2 CAPER Barriers to Affordable Housing response:

The Sarasota Consortium is in the process of conducting an updated Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing. Their analysis is done county wide and will include the City of Venice. The last Analysis of Impediments to Fair Housing Choice in Sarasota County was completed on April 1, 2002.

The Sarasota Office of Housing and Community Development provided education and outreach to landlords, property owners, realtors, developers, banks and non-profit organizations who provide or develop affordable housing. On April 21, the county held a seminar for landlords, realtors, and others dealing with housing issues on the federal Fair Housing Act. In addition, the city sought ways to assist developers and all of those involved in affordable housing in locating land, providing waivers of fees, and providing technical assistance to encourage the development of affordable housing and compliance with fair housing laws.

Public policies are designed to balance competing interests in the community. To ensure that the interests of affordable housing are being considered, the City of Venice requires all public policies be reviewed for impact on the cost of housing before City Council considers and adopts them. The Bridges development, which is low and mixed income, is being reviewed by city planners.

The city is in the process of reviewing its permit fee rates to lower them for low/moderate income rental and homeowner developments.

HOMELESS

Homeless Needs

Program Year 2 CAPER Homeless Needs response:

The Suncoast Partnership to End Homelessness, the Continuum of Care (CoC) provider, has worked exceptionally hard to address homelessness due to the recession. As the lead agency for the Continuum of Care for Sarasota and Manatee Counties, they are focused on all activities relating to addressing issues of homelessness in the community.

The activities in 2010 include:

- Securing grants on behalf of service providers that help the homeless.
- Finding new approaches to shelter the homeless.
- Developing initiatives to fill any service gaps.
- Fostering public education and outreach programs.
- Providing a system of services resulting in self sufficiency and self determination.

Presently, the partnership collaborates with over twenty agencies in the two county area to understand the most pressing needs of the homeless. Their goal is to find out who the homeless are, where they stay, what services they currently receive, and, most importantly, what services are lacking from the current provider systems. This valuable information is gathered into a standardized database (Homelessness Management Information System or HMIS). This data is used to report statistics to various funders to help quantify the homeless problems in our area. The analysis of this data also aids in identifying the successes and gaps in services to the local providers enabling them to better manage their valuable resources.

The CoC works with the annual federal grant application process commonly known as the SHP SuperNOFA. This annual grant updated the Continuum of Care Plan and provides funding for five key CoC programs: Our Mother's House in Venice for homeless young mothers and children and Casa San Jose for homeless men with HIV/AIDS--both Catholic Charities projects; the F. A. I. T. H. program for young parents with children, a project of the Salvation Army, and transitional supportive housing for victims of domestic violence, provided through a collaboration of SPARCC and HOPE Family Services and the Suncoast Partnership's HMIS expanded services

at Renaissance Manor and new homeless housing under construction at Harvest House in Sarasota.

The State of Florida cut funding to Homeless Coalitions by 80% last year, severely limiting the capacity of the Suncoast Partnership to End Homelessness ability to maintain the level of service to homeless service providers in Sarasota County.

Four agencies received \$96,000 this year from the state for homeless outreach (Manatee Glens), legal services (Gulfcoast Legal Services), homeless prevention services (provided by Jewish Family and Children's Service in Manatee County and Catholic Charities in Sarasota & Manatee Counties).

The Continuum of Care lost 28 transitional housing beds and 115 permanent housing beds between 2008 and 2009. There was no change in emergency housing. (update when info through Sept. 2010 is available).

According to HMIS data, participating Continuum of Care agencies provided a total of 18,827 meals in June 2010. 408 households were given services, 700 individuals were given emergency shelter, in June 2010. The number of people receiving services is averaging 900 people per month more than last year. The city regularly refers homeless individuals or those in need of assistance to the Continuum of Care.

Specific Homeless Prevention Elements

1. Identify actions taken to prevent homelessness.

Program Year 2 CAPER Specific Housing Prevention Elements response:

The Sarasota Consortium and the Suncoast Partnership to End Homelessness are working together to develop a plan to provide federal homeless prevention financial aid to people that are homeless or at risk of homelessness in our community. The Suncoast Partnership to End Homelessness was awarded a TBRA Grant (Tenant Based Rental Assistance) to provide four units of housing to chronically homeless individuals/families.

The Partnership was awarded a \$96,000 State of Florida Challenge Grant on behalf of Gulfcoast Legal Services, Jewish Family and Children's Service, Manatee Glens and Catholic Charities, Diocese of Venice. The grants will enable Manatee Glens to maintain outreach services to homeless people with mental illness, expand the Building Strong Families program of the Jewish Family and Children's Service in Manatee County, enhance legal services for homeless and at-risk families and reach special needs homeless populations that are currently underserved.

2010 goals for the Continuum of Care included:

- Implementing a "Staying Housed" Initiative, moving 12 persons who are homeless into permanent housing with supportive services.
- Request funds from local, state and federal sources for 45 subsidies/housing units for chronically homeless individuals residing in homeless shelters
- Create 40 permanent supportive beds for chronically homeless men and women. Expand system wide housing locator program through HMIS and 211 to increase movement from transitional housing to permanent housing by 25%
- Continue to expand permanent housing transition through HOPE Family Services, Inc. leasing project for at least 6 women and their children.

- Provide rental and/or utility deposits, first and/or last month rents to at least 30 resident families a year through Challenge funding or other resources.
- Assist 50 persons who are homeless and unemployed in back to work subsidies.
- Expand services to prevent eviction and provide personal finance training to those in permanent housing.
- Expand system wide housing locator system.

The federal Homeless Prevention and Rapid Re-Housing Program (HPRP) provided funds for areas just outside city limits. The Partnership is working closely with both Manatee and Sarasota County governments to implement programs that best serve community need.

Program Year 2 CAPER Community Development response:

Funds were expended this year toward the city's highest priority target group, low income elderly by providing funds toward the housing authority redevelopment.

The housing authority met with city staff on several occasions to coordinate redevelopment efforts. In the Action Plans, the city allocated funds to the housing authority, municipal mobile home park, food banks and administration. The municipal mobile home park drainage will be paid for by another grant. All Faith's Food Bank, which provides funds to all the local food distribution sources, contacted the city and stated they are receiving a large amount of support from USDA and would not need the city's CDBG funds. The Venice Housing Authority is the highest priority project and after discussion with city and county staff, it was decided to allocate the funds to the housing authority redevelopment since it is the highest priority project. The housing authority directly benefits low/moderate income, affordable housing and the elderly population.

If the city continued to receive CDBG funds, everything would have been allocated to the housing authority since it is clear that low income elderly housing is the biggest community need.

There were no loans, program income, lump sum agreements, prior period adjustments, non-eligible activities, displacement, or relocation done in the second program year.

Antipoverty Strategy

Program Year 2 CAPER Antipoverty Strategy response:

The city continued to participate under the Sarasota Consortium programs that are designed to reduce the number of poverty level households in Sarasota County through the provision of human services, the creation of economic opportunities in low-income areas, and the improvement of the physical condition of lower income areas. The largest element of the anti-poverty strategy is the community's successful implementation of the Continuum of Care for the homeless and those in danger of becoming homeless as mentioned in the homeless section.

The city continued to work with the Gulf Coast Community Foundation of Venice for providing workforce housing opportunities. Also, there have been new businesses opening in the city, and existing businesses expanding this year that provided more job opportunities.

Self Evaluation:

This is the second and last year that the City of Venice received entitlement CDBG funds. The city will join the county program in 2011.

In the 2008-2013 Consolidated Plan, the city indicated that it would receive SHIP funds from the state. This decision was reversed based on the amount of project administration involved and questionable future funding of the SHIP program.

Major goals of the Action Plan and Consolidated Plan are on target, with the largest factors being assistance to the Venice Housing Authority and low income elderly.

Barriers on the overall vision include:

- Reduced funding for non-profits
- Reduced SHIP program outlook
- Decrease in city staff due to the recession

Program priorities are well on track and CDBG funds will be spent in the upcoming months.
